1. What project-related developments, either directly or indirectly, took place in the past months (in the field, press/media, research outcomes, local community and unforeseen circumstances?) (Max. 300 words)

Several construction works were completed between March and May 2021. These include, completion of separate septic tanks for the Clinic (Fig: 1), the foundation, sidewalls and the roof structure of the quarantine building (Fig. 2), the readjustment of the access road (Fig. 3), installation of street lights at the entrance and along the access road (Fig. 4), and the planting of trees (*Syzygium oleina*) along the property boundary (Fig. 5). In the case of the quarantine building, the construction work is more than 90% complete and planned to be finished by June 2021. In the case of the access road, the readjustment and strengthening of the road was necessary due several incidents of collapse due to bad weather that slowed down the construction work of rescue center facilities. After reevaluating the position of the access road, we decided that the most effective way to rebuild the access road was by moving the road 2 meters inwards from the drain and constructing the initial road foundation. Other milestones include the development and handover of eight (8) temporary holding cages to West Kalimantan BKSDA (Fig. 6).





In addition to ongoing construction and development work, we have finalised the hiring of a veterinarian experienced in avian species who will join our team from June 2021. In order to develop the capacity of our veterinarian on specific issues such as songbird care, handling, and aspects of clinic management and hygiene, we will coordinate with the Cikananga Conservation Breeding Center (CCBC) located in West Java for an in-depth traineeship in the coming quarters of 2021.

2. Can you please give us a short status update on objectives and goals you specified in your project proposal?

In our proposal to EAZA Silent Forest, we requested funds to sponsor the construction of one block of aviary. As reported previously, construction work for the aviary is still on track and scheduled to begin by Q3 (July-September) 2021. At present, we have finalised the budget for the construction of the aviary building. As we are following a progressive construction plan for the Wak Gatak Songbird Rescue Center, we have prioritised the most urgent needs to be built first. As we have finished construction of the Clinic building and are currently developing the quarantine building (>90% complete), our next major construction work will be the Aviary building. Once the Aviary building is complete, we will have the infrastructure to start basic operations related to rehabilitation of confiscated songbirds in West Kalimantan, Indonesia.

In addition, this year Wak Gatak will add a behavior change campaign focusing on the issue of songbird competitions in West Kalimantan.
